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# FOREWORD FROM THE TRUSTEES

This year the Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust (Appeal Trust) moved into a phase more focused on the administration and monitoring of grants. The \$100 million raised by the Appeal had been allocated to portfolios by March 2014 and by June 2015, \$55 million had been paid to organisations to undertake their project, activity or event. \$10 million worth of grants was paid in the past year.

Of the \$45 million still to be paid, \$15 million has been committed to the “Connecting the City to the Sea” project, for redeveloping the riverside and red-zoned land throughout the Eastern suburbs. These funds will be available for allocation to projects once land-use decisions have been made.

The Appeal Trust acknowledges the fantastic work that has been done on the rebuild and recovery. It also acknowledges that grant recipients with projects yet to start are navigating a range of multi-faceted issues. In some cases they are relying on decisions by external groups before work can commence.

It is clear there is still a need for the provision of support and assistance for those struggling in the post-earthquake period. In the last financial year, \$2.8 million has been assigned to multiple agencies to improve the well-being of children and young people, and to social services assisting individuals experiencing hardship.

Donations to the Appeal have enabled several noteworthy milestones to be achieved in the past year including:

- › Reopening of the Isaac Theatre Royal
- › Opening the new Hagley Pavilion
- › Progression towards completion of the restoration of the Clock Tower and College Hall at the Arts Centre
- › Community Centres for the Aranui and Heathcote communities getting under way
- › Reopening of Cholmondeley Children’s Centre.

The Appeal Trust anticipates that approximately \$15 million will be paid in the next financial year as more projects get under way. Project progress will be closely monitored, particularly plans for the riverside and red-zoned land.

The Trustees are no longer regularly meeting as the donations raised by the Appeal have been allocated. The Trustees last met together in March 2014 and have continued our activity through the use of email.

The Appeal Trust will remain in regular contact with lead organisations and stakeholders involved in the rebuild and recovery.

# FROM THE PRIME MINISTER

Five years on from the Canterbury earthquakes provides an opportunity to reflect on the significant progress that has been made in rebuilding the city.

While the rebuild has had its challenges, what has been achieved has been remarkable and we are now moving from the recovery to the regeneration phase.

Through sheer hard work by Christchurch residents and businesses, the Government and all its strategic partners - the Christchurch City Council, the Waimakariri District Council, the Selwyn District Council, Environment Canterbury and Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu - greater Christchurch is re-emerging as a truly vibrant city.

The Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust has also played an important role in supporting worthy projects.

I was fortunate to open the Cholmondeley Children's Centre recently which received significant funding from the Trust. The Centre offers a place to stay for young New Zealanders whose families are experiencing stress or crisis. Those young people will benefit hugely from the Centre and the Trust's support helped make this possible. It is another great addition to the city, and each time I return I'm heartened by the progress I see.

As well as Cholmondeley I've recently had the privilege of opening a number of new facilities in and around the city.

Our key anchor projects are progressing well - the Hagley Cricket Oval and the Bus Interchange have both recently been completed.

The new Russley Road interchange, which is part of a massive investment in rebuilding and upgrading the city's roads, is underway along with the Margaret Mahy Family Playground, which will be open by this Christmas.

By the end of next year, the \$300 million Justice and Emergency Services Precinct will be completed and hundreds of public sector employees will progressively begin returning back into the central city.

The Government has played a huge role in the rebuild and remains committed to supporting that, but the time has come to begin stepping back and allowing local leadership to take more control. The Greater Christchurch Regeneration Bill, which will come into force in April 2016, will ensure regeneration of the region beyond emergency response and recovery, with a clear focus on the future.

The city and its people have made incredible progress in the years since the devastating earthquakes.

I am proud of what has been achieved and excited about what will come next.

## SKY's \$1 million update

In May 2013, SKY pledged \$200,000 per year for five years to help repair the city, focusing on sport and recreational facilities particularly for school-aged children. \$600,000 of this generous pledge has been allocated with a further \$200,000 to be allocated in 2016 and 2017.

## Repairs at Garrick Park

With the help of SKY's donation three football pitches that were completely destroyed by the earthquake were restored and are back in use. The grant solved the immediate post-earthquake challenges and contributed to the growth of football.

## West Spreydon School pool

The earthquake destroyed West Spreydon School's pool just five days after its upgrade had been completed. SKY's donation helped ensure the longevity of this hub of community life.

## Repairs at Denton Oval

At Denton Oval, SKY's donation will enable the lighting, changing rooms, showers and toilets to be upgraded and the track rails replaced. Following the upgrade the facility will support local cycling for the next 10 to 20 years.












# PROJECT UPDATES



# LARGE PERMANENT

## *portfolio*

**\$34.75 million**  
funded to  
30 June 2015

**Aimed to fund projects (valued at \$1,000,000 or more) to make a positive difference to greater Christchurch and the Canterbury region for 20-50 years and leave a legacy to the Appeal. Priority was given to large-scale, multi-purpose, collaborative projects that benefit the wider community, directly meet an earthquake-related need, and invested in the future of Canterbury.**

## Isaac Theatre Royal reopens \$3 million

The “Grand Old Lady of Christchurch” reopened on 17 November 2014 with a sold-out performance of Kostroma by the Russian National Dance Company, followed by the Royal New Zealand Ballet’s A Christmas Carol. Since reopening, bookings have increased by 50 per cent on the year prior to the earthquakes and the theatre is taking bookings into 2019.

Following the 2011 earthquake, the Edwardian Isaac Theatre Royal was left with only its historic façade, stage and back-of-house facilities relatively intact. Strengthening work carried out in the previous decades prevented total loss of the theatre, which is considered to have outstanding national heritage significance. However, serious deconstruction was required before the building could be restored to its previous splendour.

The Theatre Royal Charitable Foundation received two grants totalling \$3 million from the Appeal Trust for the restoration of the theatre. Work began in 2012 with the removal of the historic hand-painted and gilded dome.

The theatre’s many heritage features - including the dome, plaster mouldings, marble staircase and leadlight windows - have been faithfully restored or reproduced by experts. The Isaac Theatre Royal was the first performing arts project to get under way and set the scene for the rejuvenation of the arts precinct in Christchurch.

Other major contributors to the \$40 million project were the New Zealand Lottery Grants Board, Canterbury Earthquake Heritage Buildings Fund, significant international performing arts philanthropic donations and community fundraising.

## Water attractions for the Eastern Recreation and Sports Centre \$6.5 million

The Appeal Trust contributed funding to eight large permanent projects designed to generate a positive difference to greater Christchurch and the Canterbury region and leave a legacy from the Appeal. One of these projects, the Eastern Recreation and Sports Centre on Queen Elizabeth II Park got under way in September 2015.

In February 2013, the Appeal Trust allocated \$6.5 million for water attractions at the north eastern suburbs Sport and Recreation Centre committed to by Christchurch City Council. The Trustees wanted the Appeal Trust's contribution to enhance the facility and decided funding attractions such as hydro slides, river rides or a wave pool would achieve this.

Christchurch Mayor Lianne Dalziel has since launched the Your Play, Your Say campaign (17 September 2015) which encouraged residents, particularly children, to share their ideas about the water attractions they would like to see.

Construction is scheduled to start in August 2016 and the new facility is expected to open in 2018. This grant includes \$3.1 million from an anonymous donor and \$500,000 from the New Zealand Community Trust (NZCT).

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## Connecting the City to the Sea \$15 million

In February 2013, the Appeal Trust committed up to \$15 million towards projects that would strengthen the connection from Te Papa Otakaro/Avon River Precinct at Fitzgerald Avenue through eastern Christchurch all the way to the sea.

These funds continue to be set aside until the future use of this land is identified.

CERA is currently implementing the Residential Red Zone Offer Recovery Plan, and Crown offers are being made available to property owners. The final date for settlement is 26 February 2016 and any consultation on the future use of red zone land is likely to occur after this.

The Trustees' intention is to ensure that once decisions are made and projects are ready, funds are available to assist momentum.

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## New pavilion at Hagley Oval \$3 million (loan)

The ICC Cricket World Cup 2015 opening ceremony and the opening match - held at Christchurch's Hagley Oval - were a huge morale boost for the region.

The Appeal Trust loaned Canterbury Cricket Trust \$3 million for a new pavilion with community meeting spaces at Hagley Oval, and its completion enabled international cricket to return to Canterbury after seven years' absence.

The Prime Minister officially opened the pavilion on 15 September 2014.

Conditions of the loan include: changing rooms and public toilets being available for summer and winter sports players using the surrounding grounds; the pavilion being used for suitable events other than cricket; the meetings rooms be made available to community groups at reasonable rates; and a number of complimentary match tickets for cricket games to be made available for people adversely affected by the earthquakes, including younger cricket players and members of the wider community.

Provided these conditions are met, the Appeal Trust can write-off the loan in instalments of \$600,000 until 2019. As at 30 June 2015, Canterbury Cricket Trust's loan balance stands at \$3 million.



# COMMUNITY PERMANENT

## *portfolio*



**Aimed to fund smaller-scale permanent projects (valued at \$100,000 or more) to make a positive difference primarily to local communities for 20-50 years and leave a legacy to the Appeal. Priority was given to small to medium-scale, multi-purpose, collaborative projects that directly met an earthquake-related need and invested in the future of Canterbury.**

## Community Centres at Aranui and Heathcote \$1.62 million

### ARANUI

Construction began this year on a new \$5.9 million community and youth centre for Aranui and neighbouring communities. A sod-turning event in June 2015 led this milestone and also acknowledged the community's input into the design and layout. The new centre will be a place for youth and the community to resume cultural, recreational and sporting activities and is expected to be in use by mid-2016.

The Appeal Trust granted \$1 million towards the new facility being built by Christchurch City Council, to help fill the void left by the loss of the Aranui Wainoni Family Centre and the Aranui Community Hall. The Appeal Trust's grant included \$500,000 from an anonymous donor. The Lions Club International also contributed funds to the project.

### HEATHCOTE


The new Heathcote Community Centre will enable pre-earthquake community activities to recommence in suitable premises. It will incorporate a volunteer library service, toy library service and spaces for community groups to meet.

The new centre will be located at the top of Heathcote Domain with panoramic views of the neighbourhood. A design has been confirmed and construction is due to start in early 2016. The Appeal Trust contributed \$627,000 to this Centre.



# ECONOMIC REVITALISATION

## *portfolio*



**Aimed to remove earthquake-related barriers to Canterbury having a vibrant and sustainable economy that provides ongoing employment. The Trustees focused on small to medium-sized businesses with less than 50 staff. The Trust provided support through existing organisations that support businesses.**

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## **Re:START the Heart \$3,368,523 (loan)**

The Appeal Trust provided an interest-free loan of \$3.36 million to the Re:START the Heart Trust to establish shopping and business in relocatable shipping containers. Since opening in October 2011, Re:START has provided a colourful, temporary hub that helped keep retail and hospitality businesses alive in central Christchurch. Several new permanent retail complexes are scheduled for completion in 2016 and, at that point Re:START's purpose will be fully achieved and it will begin to wind down.

Re:START the Heart Trust has repaid \$1,085,222 and continues to make quarterly repayments to the Appeal Trust.



# HARDSHIP/SPIRITUAL & FAITH

## portfolio

**\$13.68 million**  
funded to  
30 June 2015

The Trust has collaborated with agencies and organisations which have primary responsibility for responding to immediate hardship-related needs, to identify clear gaps for further support. The Trust utilised existing agencies to disburse funds. The Trust assisted with core community facilities and infrastructure and aimed to relieve the hardship of those most affected by the earthquakes.

## Cholmondeley Children's Centre \$500,000

The original 1925 Cholmondeley Homestead was permanently damaged in the earthquakes. Since then Cholmondeley has been operating from two locations. Despite the disruption Cholmondeley continued to deliver its care and support services for children aged three to 12 years whose families were in distress or crisis and whose usual supports were insufficient or unavailable.

In May 2013, the Appeal Trust granted \$500,000 while the Lion Foundation, Rata Foundation, NZCT and Cholmondeley's own fundraising campaign, including a significant bequest, have all contributed funds to rebuilding the centre. Cholmondeley adopted a child-centred approach to the design which included getting the input of children in the initial stages.

The rebuild is now complete and opening events were scheduled throughout October 2015.

## Support for Parents package \$651,400

In May 2015, the Appeal Trust granted \$651,400 for a number of activities to help parents reduce the anxiety of children and young people. The Greater Christchurch Psychosocial Committee spearheaded the Support for Parents package to improve outcomes for children and young people growing up during the Canterbury recovery. It addresses the needs of parents by equipping them to better function in a stressful environment. Coordinated by Christchurch Methodist Mission, the range of projects, events and activities includes:

- › Programmes in Linwood, New Brighton, Selwyn and Shirley that cultivate parental capacity to develop solutions to problems occurring in their community. Delivered by local organisations; Selwyn Parenting Network, Te Puna Oranga, Te Puna Oraka and Christchurch Methodist Mission.
- › Up to 40 workshops to support parents who are experiencing stress from relocation and resettlement, rebuilding and loss of services.
- › Production of a home and school resource kit for parents and teachers addressing mild-to-moderate anxiety.
- › Development of resources by the *All Right?* campaign in collaboration with Community and Public Health and the Canterbury District Health Board's schools mental health team. The initial resources will focus on Māori whanau and Pacific families.

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## Community Energy Action \$170,000

The Appeal Trust made two grants to Community Energy Action (CEA) aimed at improving housing conditions.

The first grant is being used to employ researchers to locate people still suffering from personal or housing issues and help them, either through CEA programmes or other social service providers or advisory services.

Once located, properties are passed to CEA for repair under the second grant, which contributes to the Find & Fix programme to improve conditions for primarily uninsured homes with earthquake damage that are unsanitary, non-water tight or non-air tight. Almost 25 properties were repaired within the first six months of the grant, with CEA project managing up to \$2,000 worth of repairs per property. In addition, CEA makes good use of the opportunity to carry out an energy audit of the home and apply its expertise to make homes that are repaired, warmer by offering assistance with insulation, curtains and practical advice.



# EDUCATION/YOUTH

## portfolio

**\$4.27 million**  
funded to  
30 June 2015

The Trust aimed to assist young people to continue to have access to educational and skills development opportunities despite the disruption of the earthquakes. The category focused on young people up to the age of 18 years. The Trust received advice about priorities from the Ministry of Education, but did not replicate Ministry funding.

## New Brighton youth hall refit \$408,000

Located for 25 years in what was originally a supermarket, the Youth Alive Trust's headquarters has undergone a huge transformation into a purpose-built youth and community centre, following the damage it suffered during the earthquakes.

On 19 June 2015 the multi-purpose youth gym, lounge and foyer were formally opened at a gathering of young people, parents and community leaders. Youth Alive can now offer more programmes to local youth and other community users in an area badly-hit by a loss of amenities.

In January 2012 Youth Alive Trust was granted \$408,000 towards this first stage of its multi-stage refurbishment. The funds were part of a \$5 million anonymous donation to the Christchurch Earthquake Appeal.

Further stages will provide a crèche, music room, offices, toilets, kitchen and meeting rooms.

# SPORT & RECREATION

## *portfolio*



**Aimed to maximise opportunities for Cantabrians to continue to participate in sport and recreation activities. The Trustees focused on youth participation. The Trust worked with the Sport Leadership Group (comprising Sport Canterbury, Christchurch City Council and Sport NZ) to identify priorities in this sector.**

## Kaiapoi Aquatic Centre \$1.1 million

The Kaiapoi Aquatic Centre was one of the first substantial recovery projects in Kaiapoi that the Appeal Trust contributed funds to.

On 28 June 2012, the Appeal Trust made a \$1.1 million grant towards the estimated \$5 million cost of repairing the aquatic centre. The grant included \$500,000 provided by NZCT and \$100,000 provided by the United Kingdom Earthquake Appeal Trust. Waimakariri District Council and insurance monies funded the remaining costs.

Until the earthquakes, families and individuals of all ages from the Waimakariri and neighbouring areas used the Kaiapoi Aquatic Centre for aquarobics, learn-to-swim, competitive coaching, masters, schools' swimming sports and water safety programmes, pre-schooler classes, rehabilitation and hydrotherapy, and recreational swimming.

Just 12 months after construction began, the Kaiapoi Aquatic Centre was reopened by Prime Minister Rt Hon John Key on 16 August 2013, signifying the return of a much-loved recreational resource for the community. It now offers a contemporary facility with easier access, improved use of natural light and a range of swimming and recreation activities.

The WaiSwim Learn to Swim programme in Term 4 of 2014 recorded more participants than pre-earthquakes, and overall Aquatic Centre attendance numbers are showing growth.

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## Mud runs and tough kids - Sport Canterbury \$220,000

This \$220,000 grant enabled Sport Canterbury to deliver 18 events aimed at increasing sports participation in Christchurch, Selwyn and Waimakariri over a two-year period. Nearly 50,000 people, predominantly young people, got involved in events ranging from mud runs, to obstacle courses, to 'tough kid' events. Regular one-off events made participation easy and bridged the gap while damaged facilities were repaired and new facilities built.

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## Christchurch Stadium Trust \$5 million (loan)

The Appeal Trust loaned \$5 million to the Christchurch Stadium Trust toward the cost of building a temporary sports venue in Addington, now called AMI Stadium.

As part of the conditions of the loan, the facility must be available for community use, including meetings and festivals. The Stadium Trust must also set aside a portion of its revenue to enable community use at no-cost or reduced cost. Provided the community use provisions are met the Appeal Trust can write-off up to \$1 million of the loan each year. During the year the Stadium Trust hosted the FIFA U-20 World Cup, a Nitro Circus event and the Foo Fighters Concert. The Stadium Trust's loan balance remains \$2 million at 30 June 2015.

## Coastguard Waimakariri-Ashley \$314,000

Coastguard units have continued to provide daily marine search and rescue for the Waimakariri-Ashley region, despite operating from temporary accommodation since the earthquakes. Its previous building was demolished in 2014.

Coastguard Waimakariri-Ashley will move into new premises on the Kaiapoi River in early 2016, helped by a \$314,000 Appeal Trust grant. The new building will be a base for search-and-rescue operations, with rescue vessels and equipment stored on the ground floor. There will be space for meetings and training courses for Coastguard volunteers, and Coastguard Boating Education courses for the public. A radio/incident management room will also be available for use by the wider community.

The Trustees aimed to maximise the potential to preserve the heritage of Canterbury and provide opportunities for people to participate in arts and cultural activities. The focus has been on large-scale infrastructure and venues. Sector collaboration has been particularly valued.

## College Hall and Clock Tower restoration \$14.2 million

Restoration of two of the most significant of the 23 Arts Centre heritage buildings made great progress in 2014/15 and is nearing completion. The College Hall and the Clock Tower were designed by architect Benjamin Mountfort and opened in the late 1800s. Both were extensively damaged in the 2011 earthquakes and subsequently deemed unsafe.

The Appeal Trust's contribution of \$14.2 million to the restoration project draws on funds donated by the Aotearoa Foundation, Fletcher Construction, the Ministry for Culture and Heritage, and John Griffin.

The careful restoration of the College Hall and Clock Tower is being completed in several phases. The structural work is being achieved without any geometric change to the buildings, and is also enabling a comprehensive update to each building's heating, electrical and IT services infrastructure. A highlight of the project is the preservation of extensive original heritage materials throughout. The College Hall turret, removed following the earthquakes, was returned in December 2014.

The overall restoration of the Arts Centre campus is one of the most complex restoration projects attempted internationally. It is expected to be completed in 2019 at an estimated total cost of \$290 million.

The Auditor-General is the auditor of the Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust (the Trust). The Auditor-General has appointed me, Graeme Edwards, using the staff and resources of KPMG, to carry out the audit of the financial statements of the Trust, on her behalf.

**Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of the Trust on pages 3 to 14 that comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2015, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year ended on that date, and the notes to the financial statements that include accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion the financial statements of the Trust:

- present fairly, in all material respects:
  - its financial position as at 30 June 2015; and
  - its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended; and
- have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand.

Our audit was completed on 15th September 2015. This is the date at which our opinion is expressed.

The basis of our opinion is explained below. In addition, we outline the responsibilities of the Trustees and our responsibilities, and we explain our independence.

**Basis of opinion**

We carried out our audit in accordance with the Auditor-General's Auditing Standards, which incorporate the International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand). Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and carry out our audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

Material misstatements are differences or omissions of amounts and disclosures that, in our judgement, are likely to influence readers' overall understanding of the financial statements. If we had found material misstatements that were not corrected, we would have referred to them in our opinion.

An audit involves carrying out procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The Trustees are also responsible for the publication of the financial statements, whether in printed or electronic form.

The Trustees' responsibilities arise from clause 17.3 of the Trust Deed.



# Notes to the Financial Statements

## For the year ended 30 June 2015

### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Reporting entity

The reporting entity is the Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust, a registered charity under the Charities Act 2005. The Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust is domiciled and operates in New Zealand and is primarily involved in the provision of relief to the community of Christchurch and Canterbury region from the adverse effects of the earthquakes on 22 February 2011 and 4 September 2010. The Trust is a public benefit entity.

#### Reporting Period

The financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2015 were approved and authorised for issue by the Trustees on 15 September 2015.

### NOTE 2: BASIS OF PREPARATION

#### Statement of Compliance

The Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust is a public benefit entity. It is required by the Trust Deed to prepare general purpose financial statements. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZ GAAP). They comply with New Zealand equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (NZIFRS) and other applicable Financial Reporting Standards, as appropriate for public benefit entities.

From 1 April 2014, the new Financial Reporting Act 2013 ("FRA 2013") has come into force replacing the Financial Reporting Act 1993, this is effective for all not-for-profit entities with reporting periods beginning on or after 1 April 2015. This will be effective for the Christchurch Earthquake Appeals Trust's (CEAT) 30 June 2016 year end.

Management expects that CEAT will be reporting under the PBE Standards as applicable for not for-profit entities. Management expects that this will not materially impact the preparation and disclosures included in the financial statements. This will be applicable for CEAT's 30 June 2016 year end.

#### Measurement Base

The financial statements have been prepared on an historical cost basis.

#### Standards, amendments and interpretations issued that are not yet effective and have not been adopted early

In October 2014, the PBE suite of accounting standards was updated to incorporate requirements and guidance for the not-for-profit sector. These updated standards apply to PBEs with reporting periods beginning on or after 1 April 2015. The Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust will apply these updated standards in preparing its 30 June 2016 financial statements. The Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust expects there will be minimal or no change in applying these updated accounting standards.

#### Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$). All financial information presented in New Zealand dollars has been rounded to the nearest dollar.

### NOTE 3: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following particular accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied.

#### Revenue

The Trust derived income from public donations and interest on bank balances and short-term investments. Donations are recognised when funds are received by the Trust. Interest income is recognised when earned and is reported in the period to which it relates. Interest income is recognised in the surplus/(deficit) as it accrues, using the effective interest method. The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the next carrying amount of the financial asset.

#### Expenditure

Grants are recognised as expenditure when approved by the Trustee. The administrative costs of the Trust are met by the Department of Internal Affairs. Any reimbursement of costs incurred by the Trust are treated as donation of goods and services and reported as such in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

**Cash and Cash Equivalents**

The Trust treats cash and cash equivalents based on the term of the Term Deposit, not term to maturity from Balance Date. According to NZIAS 7, in the statement of cashflows, an investment normally qualifies as a cash equivalent only when it has a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

**Taxation**

The Trust is exempt from income tax under section CW 42(1) (a) of the Income Tax Act 2007. The Trust has been granted tax exempt status and is registered as a Charity under the Charities Act 2005.

**Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

The Trust is GST registered. The financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis.

**Accounts Receivable**

Accounts receivable are stated at their expected realisable value after providing for doubtful and uncollectible debts.

**Financial Instruments**

Non-derivative financial instruments comprise investments in cash and cash equivalents, trade receivables, trade and other payables and other liabilities.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are measured at fair value plus transaction costs. Any profits or loss from the financial transaction are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances, call and term deposits.

**Impairment of financial assets**

Financial assets are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of each reporting period. They are impaired where there is objective evidence that the estimated future cash flows have been impacted. Objective evidence could include:

- › Significant financial difficulty of the counterparty;
- › Default or late payments; or
- › It becoming probable that the counterparty will enter bankruptcy or financial re-organisation.

The recoverable amount of the Trust's receivables carried at amortised cost is calculated at the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate. Impairment being the difference between carrying amount and recoverable amount, is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Impairment losses on an individual basis are determined by an evaluation of the exposures on an instrument by instrument basis. All individual instruments that are considered significant are subject to this approach.

**Statement of Cash Flows**

For the purpose of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and banks. The following terms are used in the statement of cash flows:

*Operating activities* are the principal revenue producing activities of the Trust and other activities that are not investing or financial activities.

*Investing activities* are the acquisition and disposal of long term assets and other investments not included in cash equivalents.

*Financial activities* are activities that result in changes in the size and composition of the borrowings of the Trust.

**Change in Accounting Policies**

There have been no changes in accounting policies from the previous year.

**NOTE 4: REVENUE****Donations**

The donations and interest received over the life of the trust, plus pledges for 2015 (per note 15) reflects the total \$99.6m of funds generated shown elsewhere in the Annual Report.

**NOTE 12: FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT**

All assets of the Trust are classified as Loans and Receivable and the carrying values are equal to the fair values. All Liabilities are classified as Financial Liabilities at amortised cost and the carrying values are equal to their fair values.

**Off Balance Sheet Exposure:**

The Trust had no off balance sheet exposure at 30 June 2015 (2014: Nil).

**Interest Rate Risk:**

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The cash flow risk is managed by maintaining the majority of the interest bearing instruments at fixed rates. The term deposits are made for varying periods depending on the cash requirements of the Trust and earn interest at the respective short term deposit rates. The Board does not consider that there is significant interest rate risk exposure on the Trust's investments.

**Foreign Currency Risk:**

All grants are paid in New Zealand currency. Any donations received in a foreign currency are translated to New Zealand dollars on the date of receipt. Any currency movement would have no effect on the Trust.

**Fair Value:**

All current financial instruments recognised in the statement of financial position are stated at carrying amounts that are also a reasonable approximation of their fair values.

**Credit risk:**

Credit risk is the risk that a third party will default on its obligation causing a loss.

Credit risk is reduced by investing only in New Zealand registered trading banks under the Reserve Bank of New Zealand Act 1989.

**Liquidity risk:**

In meeting its liquidity requirements, the Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust maintains a target level of investments that must mature within specified timeframes to meet projected grants.

**NOTE 13: RELATED PARTIES**

There were no related party transactions entered into during the year to 30 June 2015.

**NOTE 14: COMMITMENTS**

There were no commitments as at 30 June 2015 (2014: Nil).

**NOTE 15: PLEDGED DONATIONS**

There were contingent assets for pledged donations at 30 June 2015 of \$400,000 (2014: \$600,000). This amount reflects the best estimate of the Trustees of the amount likely to be received from pledges committed prior to 30 June 2015. Some pledges have restrictions on how the funds can be applied. The actual amount received may be higher or lower than this estimate.

The Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Trust is currently undergoing a GST audit by the IRD. At this stage the outcome of this audit is unknown, therefore any effect on the financial position of the Trust will be reflected in the 2016 accounts.
